Comments

Interesting or Unusual Species:

- An Ash-throated Flycatcher was reported in the Writing-on-Stone count this is a new species for the count, and brings the cumulative species count to 341 species since 1976. This is an Alberta rarity and has been reported to the Alberta Bird Records Committee.
- A **Black-chinned Hummingbird** was reported in Cardston seen only six times in the count back to 1976. This is an Alberta rarity; no details are available about the ABRC reporting status.
- Two **Lewis's Woodpeckers** were reported in the Calgary count one in the middle of the city, a much-reported bird that stuck around for weeks, and one in the Sheep River Basin south-west of the city (8 reports since 1976)

Other Observations or Highlights:

- This was a low year for overall bird numbers, with 45,000 fewer birds seen vs. the 15-year average. Over 70% of this drop was due to low numbers of gulls (especially Franklin's, down over 12,500 birds or 43%), water birds (many species, but especially Canada Goose), and shorebirds (nearly all species, especially Black-bellied Plover). Swallow counts were also well below average, especially Cliff Swallows (down over 3,700 or 45%).
- Four species saw an all-time high, including widespread species (Common Grackle), and more narrowly distributed species like Blackburnian Warbler, Fox Sparrow and Loggerhead Shrike.
- Expected species that were missed this year are Yellow Rail, Yellow-bellied Flycatcher, Sabine's Gull, American
 Goshawk, and Lark Bunting (these last three were reporting during count week). All of these species have been
 seen 14 or 15 of the last 15 years.
- Four species were observed at every count location in Alberta: Canada Goose, Mallard, Barn Swallow and Redwinged Blackbird. 26 species were observed in only one count location.

Interesting or Unusual Species: First ever Bohemian Waxwing (CW only) - have photos. Brings count total species including CW to 255! Flock of snow geese lingering on Timko Reservoir. Two Eurasian Wigeon in different zones.

Other Observations or Highlights: 8 below 24 year count day species average - 3 higher than last year. Total individual birds almost 1/2 of average. Birds found this year that have been seen in less than 10 years on the count: Tundra Swan, Turkey Vulture, Bald Eagle, Long-eared Owl, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Golden-crowned Kinglet, Black & White Warbler. Misses of regular birds seen 20-25 years: Short-billed Dowitcher, Lesser Yellowlegs, Greater Yellowlegs, Thick-billed Longspur, Grasshopper Sparrow, Lark Sparrow, Spotted Towhee.

Weather & Conditions: Cool, on and off wind and rain. More water in ephemeral ponds than in prior years.

Calgary

Area Covered: 80 km circle centered on Centre Street Bridge in downtown Calgary, encompassing 20,114 sq

km. The area extends to just south of Olds in the North, just north of Nanton in the south, just

west of Exshaw and Highway 40 in the west and just past Standard in the east.

The area covers portions of the Rocky Mountains, Foothills, Parkland and Grassland biomes, and

is within the western Central Flyway and eastern Pacific (Rocky Mountain) Flyway of bird migration. The area falls just east of the Rocky Mountains, which served as a barrier that separated distinct populations of many species that lived in North America during several

periods of glaciation.

Comments

Interesting or Unusual Species: Unusual species this year included:

- six Wild Turkeys in the Sheep River area southwest of the city (reported only 3 times in Calgary count history back to 1979);
- two Lewis's Woodpeckers, one a recent celebrity bird at Carburn Park in the city and the other in the Sheep River area (5 reports since 1979);
- an American Tree Sparrow in the Sheep River area (5 reports since 1979);
- three Lark Sparrows in two areas east and south-east of the city (10 reports since 1979);
- two Rough-legged Hawks east of Calgary (11 reports since 1979).

Other Observations or Highlights: This year, species and bird counts were well below average. 198 species were observed vs. a 15-year average of 210, and just over 60,200 birds were reported, down 24% vs. the 15-yr average of 79,600.

Challenging conditions on count weekend were likely a factor, but migration timing may also have had an effect. The single largest factor in the low count is Franklin's Gulls (6,800 of the 20,000 drop vs. 15-yr avg), with California gulls next. The gulls along with drops in Cliff Swallows and Eared Grebes make up just over half of the drop vs. average.

New records were set for seven species: Snow Goose, Wild Turkey, Osprey, Northern Flicker, Black-capped Chickadee, Purple Martin and Common Grackle. Ferruginous Hawk, Belted Kingfisher, Lewis's Woodpecker and Hairy Woodpecker counts tied with prior records.

The drop in species count is spread out over a number of groups - fewer species of raptors, hummingbirds, gulls/terns and finches were reported than average. We missed some "regulars", but that was mostly offset by a few unexpected species.

We had about the same number of participants as average, but distance (-47%) and time (-15%) were down. Some of this is likely the switch to using eBird instead of templates - we see only the mileage reported in checklists now, where in prior years people may have reported their full driving distance.

Weather & Conditions: Conditions were challenging across the count area over count weekend. It was generally cool, with variable rain (light showers in some areas, downpours in others), wind gusting up to 50-60 kph, and occasional sunny breaks.

Although no new species were recorded, there were a number seen for only the second time ever: Black-chinned Hummingbird, Dusky Flycatcher, Pileated Woodpecker, Red Crossbill and Gray-cheeked Thrush. In addition, Alder Flycatcher was recorded for only the third time.

Weather & Conditions: Temperature both days ranged from 8 to 16°C. Wind both days ranged from 7 to 25 km/hr. No precipitation.

Weather & Conditions: Temperatures ranged anywhere from -2 to 20 degrees Celsius. The wind direction was variable as was the cloud cover (anywhere from 10 to 100%). Wind speeds were calm for the most part - around 10-15 km/hr. The only exception was in Zone 17, where the winds went to 50 km/hr.

Area of transition between Parkland Agricultural areas and Boreal forest, with many lakes, sloughs and wetlands of various sizes. The count area included Cold Lake Provincial Park, English Bay, North Bay, HorseShoe Bay and Marina, Jesse and Charlotte Lake, Ernestina Lake, Angling Lake, Ethel, Hilda and Marie Lakes, Crane Lake, Margaurite Lake, Manitokan Lake, Moose Lake PP and Muriel Lake MD Park. This covered areas within WR51-55, WR40-45, WR30-33, WR 20-22, WR10-14, and WR01-04, WR23,24,25 and WR 34,35 were covered this count. Count areas in WR15, WR25-26 and WR 35 received only cursory coverage due to remoteness and limited count participation. Moose Lake and Marie Lake parks were only covered during count week. Jesse and Charlotte Lake wetland/shorebird areas also unfortunately received much of their coverage during count week with limited weekend coverage due participation shortfalls.

Interesting or Unusual Species: A probable extra-limital Prairie Falcon was observed perched overlooking the cleared Wolf Lake Community Pasture lands north of La Corey 26 May. See eBird report https://ebird.org/checklist/S177474294.

A possible Arctic Tern, or Arctic Tern hybrid, was observed on Moose Lake's Vaseaux Beach dock of 23 May and possibly again 26,27 May. eBird reports https://ebird.org/checklist/S176571198, https://ebird.org/checklist/S177527397, and https://ebird.org/checklist/S177385673

Other Observations or Highlights: This was our 24th annual count with 170 species reported for count weekend, and an additional 9 reported during count week. The overall total of 179 is slightly above average of the 176 for the count's previous 23 years, and the count weekend number of 170 is up from the 166 average. The number seen only on count

week was close to the 9.5 average. This year we had an earlier count period, with cooler, wetter pre-count weather and fewer field participants. Next year again will be an early date with the count in 2025 on May 24/25.

This year we had 7 participants in the field, along with contributions from 13 feeder watchers and 8 visiting eBirders.

Swans: For the 3rd straight year and only our 3nd count record, swans were reported on our count. This year a pair of Tundra/Trumpeter (probably Trumpeter) Swans were observed at Crane (Moore) Lake (S177268207) but were too distant to confirm. Our 1st count record of Trumpeter Swan was in 2022 also at Crane Lake.

Geese: A late migrating pair of Greater White Fronted Geese (\$178681073 \$178682578) were reported at Charlotte Lake; a first report since 2013 and 10th count week record.

Pine Grosbeaks were reported by a feeder watcher with a flock of 15 on the weekend in River Ridge Estates (\$179166843,\$182145055) and 1 was observed during the CW BBS survey. eBird reports indicate an extensive southern migration of this species and many May records of late returns to the northern breeding areas.

Other "C List" species (seen on less than 25% of Counts) are as follows: Black-Necked Stilt -5th Record. Continue to nest in Jessie/Charlotte Lake area - multiple eBird reports; Short-Billed Dowitcher 3rd count record - Manatokan/Iron River Wetlands x1 (S177041955) and Big Meadow slough x1 (S177314683). In addition, 2 were reported at Jesse Lake CW with photos (S176562319). A House Finch was reported in CLPP, our 6th count record (S177874139) and Bobolinks were once again on nesting territory for 6th year in Bonnyville/Ft Kent area with 1 on reported count weekend (S177465174) and 4 during count week at 2 locations.

Significant A List misses (seen 75% plus years) include Yellow Rail, American Golden Plover, and White-Crowned Sparrow.

21 of the expected 22 Warbler species were seen on the weekend, with the 22nd reported count week - the most numerous was Yellow Warbler, followed by Tennessee and Ovenbird.

Top billing for overall numbers goes to Franklin's Gull, followed by Eared Grebe, Black Tern and Red-Winged Blackbird.

Weather & Conditions: Day 1: Partly to Mostly Cloudy. Low Temp 3C High Temp 14C (avg for date 7-17C). Wind E to SE 4 km/h incr thru afternoon/eve to 20 km/h.

Day 2: Clear to Mostly Clear in AM, Partly to Mostly Cloudy in PM. Low Temp 1C High Temp 19C (avg for date 7-17C) Wind N to NE 4 to 17 km/h. There was some early morning fog/mist in some areas.

Count weekend was preceded by a week of wet, cool weather which only started to improve on the weekend. There was precipitation and below avg temps through much of May. Count hours of daylight 16hr 37min & 16hr 40min. Water levels were variable with most sloughs and lakes still lower than last year's count providing several good mud flats on some of the shallow water bodies.

Interesting or Unusual Species: Ash-throated Flycatcher found by Donna Wieckowski, photographed by Arthur Wieckowski. Report to Alberta Bird Records Committee sent with photos and confirmed as ATFL May 31.

1st ever American Tree Sparrow on count, 2nd Harris's Sparrow, 1st ever Evening Grosbeak, 1st ever Pine Grosbeak, 3 burrowing owls (2 of them in a new spot).

Other Observations or Highlights: Very happy "The Chat Came Back". Record number of participants this year. Including count week birds we are 8 above average for species but a bit low on individuals - probably owing to the windy and rainy conditions on Sunday. But we increased our total birds seen, including count week, to 241 species!!

There was more water in the area than in many years but it didn't translate to more individual birds. Had all the regular birds - no misses. Besides the new and extremely rare birds mentioned we had 11 other irregular birds seen 6 or less years on the count.

Counters saw: Pronghorn Antelope twin babies being born, a Golden Eagle take a fox kit, a Pronghorn fight off a red fox to defend her young, swift foxes at den.

Weather & Conditions: Saturday: 9-18C, calm, clear to part clouds. Sunday: 9-17C, windy in am to extremely windy in pm, cloudy all day.


Alberta May Species Count History

The Alberta May Species Count (MSC) has been running since 1976, and has grown steadily over the years. As you might expect, records are not perfect over that period, and data is currently not available for 1980, 1983, 1985, 1996-2002, 2004 and 2005.


The first Alberta May Species Count identified 184 different species, and based on the data available, another 156 species have been added on count days since then. This brings us to a cumulative total of 341 species, plus another four "count week" species (observed a few days before or after the count but never on count days) since 1976.

The first Alberta MSC included 76 participants who spent 47 hours counting birds in 9 locations, with a total count of 9,441 birds. These days we average about 400 participants at 15 to 20 locations, usually spending nearly 1,600 hours and observing around 215,000 individual birds
